

# Plenary Address by Dr. Nico Jooste

## "Study Abroad: The Triumph of the Commons | Demanding the Impossible"

Study abroad—as a concept, process, and practice in the internationalization of higher education—is interpreted differently, depending on an institution's location, culture, and resources (e.g., North versus South, developed versus developing, etc.). One pressing challenge for successful and integrated internationalization of higher education is to find the balance between the personal and societal benefits, of the local versus the global, in all activities, but particularly study abroad, which can be perceived as highly beneficial to the participant but perhaps of questionable value to local communities.

Indeed, perhaps the most pressing question for the practice of study abroad is its role in a polarized world, with all its inequalities. What is the focus of study abroad, the individual student? Is the students' self-discovery our primary aim? And if so, is it time re-think the practice and process of study abroad in all its complexities? Where do we find the common space to re-think our practices, so often defined by

countries and regions with power and resources? How do we go about collectively and respectively exploring the hard questions regarding access to international opportunities for our students, faculty and staff around the world?

Pivotal to developing a new ethos is whether we can develop those 'common spaces,' using the historical space of the square, the 'green' or the 'commons' as a model. The 'commons' can serve as a space where we can construct conversations that are 'borderless,' and one where study abroad—in all its forms—can further develop change agents in this unsettled world. As international educators we have the luxury and privilege to define this space that in turn, informs practice, and is not necessarily bound by the historic connections that are tied to place. How do we then re-define a space for dialogue, reflection, and critical analysis that will lead to the triumph of the commons?



Jooste has served as Senior Director of the Office for International Education at the Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University (NMMU) since July 2000. He was responsible for the development of the Office for International Education at the University as a self-funding entity, and during this time international student numbers grew from 130 to 2300. The University adopted

Comprehensive Internationalisation as a strategy and received the first award of the International Education Association of South Africa (IEASA) for Excellence in Comprehensive Internationalisation. Jooste has served in numerous leadership positions of IEASA and is the current President. He is also currently the Editor of the Study South Africa Publication.

**The Middlebury School in France**, with sites in Bordeaux, Paris, and Poitiers, is designed for students at the advanced level of French who are committed to linguistic and cultural immersion. In Paris, students take a combination of in-house courses at Middlebury's Centre Madeleine and courses at a host university. In Bordeaux and Poitiers, students direct enroll at a host university. At all sites, there is a community engagement component through internships or volunteer work, and all communication is in French, under the Middlebury Language Pledge®.



**The Middlebury School in Italy**, with sites in Ferrara, Florence, and Rome, is characterized by a focus on Italian language immersion and integration with the host culture. Students at the advanced level of Italian take one in-house course and two courses at a host university, with tutorials for additional academic support, and may participate in an internship for credit. By adhering to the Middlebury Language Pledge®, students reap the benefits of linguistic immersion for the duration of their time studying abroad.



**Pepperdine University**'s International Programs provides a unique transformational abroad experience as they manage and staff seven Pepperdine campuses in various locations in Asia, South and North America and Europe. Approximately eighty-five percent of the fall/spring participant base study the full academic year abroad. In addition, Pepperdine runs seven to ten faculty-led summer programs to non-campus locations throughout the world. All totaled, they offer nearly thirty programs annually which enables two out of three undergraduate students to have a study abroad experience by the time they graduate.



**Providence College**'s Center for International Studies, in support of the educational mission of Providence College, aims to provide opportunities for transformative academic and cultural learning experiences to help students develop and acquire the knowledge, attitudes, and skills that will prepare them to: have a diverse and knowledgeable worldview; comprehend the international dimensions of their major field of study; develop cross-cultural sensitivity and adaptability; and carry global competencies throughout life. The Center for International Education (CIE) at **St. Norbert College** facilitates dynamic adventures for and provides expert support to the College community. We partner with faculty and staff to design short-term programs; collaborate with a myriad of departments to prepare students for meaningful experiences abroad; and concentrate on holistic student development as we strive to positively impact each and every student. In the pursuit of excellence, we consistently challenge ourselves to ensure that CIE's international opportunities align the needs and interests of the College community.



**Texas Christian University**'s Center for International Studies offers study abroad programming through faculty-led programs, partner programs, our flagship TCU In Programs (London, Florence, Rome, Madrid, and Seville) and the TCU Global Academy's interdisciplinary program in developing nations. At this time, approximately 35% of students study in another country while at TCU. The Center is a strong advocate for campus-wide internationalization through the initiative Discovering Global Citizenship, a 2.8 million program to internationalize TCU. In 2015, TCU was recognized with the Heiskell Award for Comprehensive Internationalization.



**The University of Limerick**, the Times University of the Year in 2015 is a multi-disciplinary university located in the South West of Ireland. UL has welcomed Study Abroad students for over 20 years and continues to grow annually with up to 15% of enrolled students in UL being international. The Study Abroad Program at UL is a fully integrated program in that visiting students take the same modules as domestic students, share the same on-campus accommodation and are involved in the same clubs and societies. Popular with US students is the opportunity to volunteer in the local community and the UL Practicum which awards credit in a number of service learning modules.

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

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
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






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
