Definition:

# Sexual Assault / Violence

Any sexual act against another person, forcibly or with threat of force, when the person does not give consent or is unable to give consent (i.e. is unconscious, mentally incompetent, or intoxicated)

Can Include:

- Rape, fondling, assault with an object
- Use of drugs to incapacitate

# Definition: Bystander

Individuals who witness emergencies, criminal events, or situations that could lead to criminal events and by their presence may have the opportunity to intervene to provide assistance, do nothing, or contribute to the negative behavior.



## Landscape of Sexual Violence and Study Abroad

# Statistics

**20 percent**

of college-aged women are victims of sexual assault  
or attempted assault  
during their undergraduate careers

# Statistics

**6 percent**

of college men are victims of sexual assault during their  
undergraduate careers;

may be less likely to report an assault

# Statistics

**Approximately 32 percent**  
of college students are victims of violence  
by a current or former intimate partner

# Statistics

**Approximately 50 percent**  
of college women have experienced  
some form of unwanted sexual activity

# Statistics

**Approximately 38 percent**  
of college students have experienced  
some form of unwanted sexual activity *while abroad*

The Clery Act is a federal statute that requires all colleges and universities that participate in federal financial aid programs to keep and disclose information about crime on and near their respective campuses.



The Campus Sexual Violence Elimination (SaVE) Act instructs colleges and universities to provide programming for students and employees addressing the issues of dating violence, sexual assault, sexual harassment, and stalking.

# Roles

## Responsible Employee

- Person responsible for reporting sexual violence to officials (i.e. Student Conduct, Title IX Coordinator, etc.)

## Confidential Resource

- Person who is exempt from reporting by licensure, State law, or university policy

# Report vs. Disclosure

## Report

- Student tells a Responsible Employee about an incident and the university has the obligation to respond



## Disclosure

- Student tells a Confidential Resource about an incident in order to get information or access resources



# Support

## Intervention After Violence Occurs

- “I believe you. This is not your fault.”
- Assess needs for medical care
- Ongoing support through campus or local resources
- Let the student lead the process as much as possible
